This study must take into account the findings and opinions on this topic of the United States Food and Drug Administration and the American Medical Association and within any statistically valid peer-reviewed research in this area. The study group shall submit its findings in a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters no later than January 15, 2011.
