**Resolve, To Establish a Commission To Increase Housing Opportunities in Maine by Studying Zoning and Land Use Restrictions**

- 1 **Emergency preamble.** Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and 3 Whereas, this resolve establishes the Commission To Increase Housing Opportunities 4 in Maine by Studying Zoning and Land Use Restrictions; and 5 Whereas, the study must be initiated before the 90-day period expires in order that the study may be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the next 6 legislative session; and 7 8 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 9 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 10 11 therefore, be it 12 Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission To Increase 13 Housing Opportunities in Maine by Studying Zoning and Land Use Restrictions, referred to in this resolve as "the commission," is established. 14 Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 15 353, the commission consists of 15 members appointed as follows: 16 17 1. Two members of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate, including a member from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature; 18 19 2. Two members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the 20 House, including a member from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats 21 in the Legislature; 22 3. The Director of the Maine State Housing Authority, or the director's designee; 23 4. One member representing the Office of the Governor, appointed by the Governor; 24 5. Four public members, one representing a statewide municipal association, one representing a statewide organization that advocates for affordable housing, one 25 26 representing statewide agricultural interests and one who is in the building trades, 27 appointed by the President of the Senate; and 28 6. Five public members, one representing a regional planning association or a 29 statewide organization that advocates for smart growth policies and projects, one representing the real estate industry, one who is a residential developer, one representing 30 31 an organization that advocates for low-income or middle-income renters or homeowners 32 and one representing a local or statewide organization promoting civil rights that has racial 33 justice or racial equity as its primary mission, appointed by the Speaker of the House. 34 Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair 35 and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the 36 commission. 37 Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved: That all 38 appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative 39 40 Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members,
- the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the commission. If 30 days or more

after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been 1 made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for 2 3 the commission to meet and conduct its business. 4 Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission is authorized to meet 6 times and 5 shall: 1. Review data on housing shortages in the State for low-income and middle-income 6 7 households: 8 2. Review state laws that affect the local regulation of housing; 9 3. Review efforts in other states and municipalities to address housing shortages through changes to zoning and land use restrictions; 10 11 4. Consider measures that would encourage increased housing options in the State, including but not limited to municipal incentives, state mandates, eliminating or limiting 12 13 single-family-only zones and allowing greater housing density near transit, jobs, schools 14 or neighborhood centers; and 15 5. Review and consider the historical role of race and racism in zoning policies and the best measures to ensure that state and municipal zoning laws do not serve as barriers to 16 17 racial equality. 18 Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission, except that Legislative Council staff support 19 20 is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session. 21 Sec. 7. Report. Resolved: That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, no later than November 3, 2021, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and 22 23 recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the Joint Standing 24 Committee on Labor and Housing. 25 **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved. 26 27 **SUMMARY** 28 This resolve establishes the Commission To Increase Housing Opportunities in Maine 29 by Studying Zoning and Land Use Restrictions, which is a 15-member commission directed 30 to review data on housing shortages in the State for low-income and middle-income households, state laws that affect the local regulation of housing and efforts in other states 31 32 and municipalities to address housing shortages; to consider measures that would 33 encourage increased housing options in the State; and to review and consider the historical 34 role of race and racism in zoning policies and the best measures to ensure that state and 35 municipal zoning laws do not serve as barriers to racial equality. The commission must, no later than November 3, 2021, submit a report, including suggested legislation, for 36 37 presentation to the Joint Standing Committee on Labor and Housing.
