An Act To Promote Free, Appropriate Public Education

1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §7001, sub-§2-A, as amended by PL 2011, c. 477, Pt. F, §1,
is further amended to read:

2-A. Free, appropriate public education. "Free, appropriate public education" 4 means special education and related services that are provided at public expense, under 5 public supervision and direction and without charge; meet the standards of the 6 department; include an appropriate preschool, elementary school or secondary school 7 education in the State; and are provided in conformity with the individualized family 8 service plan or individualized education program. The Child Development Services 9 System shall provide free, appropriate public education to a preschool child with 10 disabilities who reaches 5 years of age between July 1st and October 15th if that child is 11 already receiving free, appropriate public education through the Child Development 12 Services System and the child's individualized education program team determines, in 13 14 accordance with rules adopted by the commissioner, that it is in the best interest of the child not to enroll that child in kindergarten until the start of the following school year. 15

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SUMMARY

This bill eliminates the provision that requires the Child Development Services System to provide free, appropriate public education to a preschool child with disabilities who reaches 5 years of age between July 1st and October 15th if the child's individualized education program team determines that it is in the best interest of the child to delay enrollment in kindergarten for one year.
