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1. It authorizes emergency medical services persons, ambulance services and nontransporting emergency medical services to dispense naloxone hydrochloride to an individual who is at risk of experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose or to the individual's immediate family, a friend of the individual or another person in a position to assist the individual; and

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2. It authorizes the chief medical officer, medical director or other administrative
prescriber employed by a federally qualified health center or group practice to access
prescription monitoring information pursuant to the Controlled Substances Prescription
Monitoring Program when the access relates to the prescriptions written by the prescribers
employed at the center or practice.

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
