SENATE AMENDMENT

1 Amend the amendment by adding before the summary the following:

2 'Amend the bill by striking out all of the emergency clause.'

SUMMARY

4 This amendment changes the timing for minimum wage increases by starting with \$10.50 per hour on January 1, 2019 and increasing it by 50¢ per hour each year until it 5 reaches \$12.00 per hour on January 1, 2022. Starting January 1, 2023 and annually 6 thereafter the minimum wage is increased by any increase in the cost of living as 7 measured by the federal Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical 8 Workers, CPI-W. The amendment also strikes from Committee Amendment "A" the 9 provisions that establish a special minimum wage applicable to unemancipated minors 10 11 under 18 years of age for the first 200 work hours of employment. The amendment also removes the emergency preamble and emergency clause. 12
