3	SUMMARY
4 5	This amendment, which is the majority report of the committee, makes the following changes to the bill.
6 7	1. It changes the name of the program from the Maine Child Care Scholarship Program to the Maine Child Care Affordability Program.
8 9	2. It clarifies that the eligibility determination for child care programs requires a complete application.
10 11	3. It clarifies that the Department of Health and Human Services is required to notify a provider of eligibility changes within 2 business days.
12 13 14	4. It clarifies that the department is required to reimburse providers within 15 days of the provision of services after receiving a complete and accurate invoice and the provider has met all the required state procurement and payment requirements.
15	5. It changes all reporting dates from December 2023 to January 15, 2024.
16 17 18	6. It changes the high-quality child care costs estimator to require the department to create and maintain a costs estimator model and removes some of the requirements for developing the tool from the bill.
19 20 21	7. It changes the requirements of the early childhood integrated data system required by the bill to clarify what is necessary and requires the department to report on its progress on the development and implementation of the system.
22	8. It removes the Child Care Task Force.
23 24 25	9. It requires Head Start providers to provide services to children up to 5 years of age who are at risk and below 185% of the federal poverty level, rather than all children below 185% of the federal poverty level.
26 27 28	10. It increases the appropriations for the initiative that increases eligibility for child care subsidies from 85% of the State's median income to 125% of the State's median income to reflect a more accurate estimate of the cost of the initiative.
