§504. Duties

The commission shall set policy with regard to: [PL 1979, c. 21 (RPR).]

The steps which are necessary and relevant to encourage and stimulate public interest and participation in the historic, architectural and archaeological heritage of our State, and to advise the State Historic Preservation Officer with regard to liaison between the State and Federal Governments and public or private agencies or organizations interested in and participating in the field of historic preservation; and
