

§227-C. Denial, suspension or revocation of permit

The commissioner may, after a hearing in conformance with the applicable provisions of the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, suspend or revoke a permit issued under this chapter. The following are grounds for denial, suspension or revocation of a permit: [PL 1999, c. 671, §6 (NEW).]

1. Incomplete. The application or a document filed with the application is incomplete; [PL 1999, c. 671, §6 (NEW).]

2. Misstatement. The application or a document filed with the application contains a material misstatement; [PL 1999, c. 671, §6 (NEW).]

3. Site inspection. The site fails to pass an inspection conducted by the department pursuant to section 227-A; or [PL 1999, c. 671, §6 (NEW).]

4. Failure to employ or use fireworks technician. The applicant fails to use a licensed fireworks technician, proximate audience technician or flame effect technician as required to conduct the display. [PL 2013, c. 56, §3 (AMD).]
