§58. Courthouse Security Fund

- 1. Creation of fund. The Courthouse Security Fund, referred to in this section as "the fund," is created under the jurisdiction and control of the Supreme Judicial Court. [PL 2005, c. 113, §1 (NEW).]
- **2. Source of fund.** The fund consists of all money appropriated or allocated for inclusion in the fund, from whatever source, and any other resources available to the fund. [PL 2005, c. 113, §1 (NEW).]
- **3. Application of fund.** Money in the fund may be used to improve security and improve public safety at court facilities under the control of the State or a subdivision of the State. Money in the fund not needed to meet the requirements of this subsection may accrue interest and be invested in a manner permitted by law.

4. Revolving fund. The fund is a nonlapsing, revolving fund.
